GUARD DEAD—CASE DISMISSED

Denis Foody, Ardskeagh, was
charged at Bradford District
Court yesterday with stealing parts
of a bicycle, the property of Guard
Martin Donohue.

Supt. Lavan, said the Guard had
died since the proceedings had been
instituted and he could not go
very far with the case.

Mr. I. M. Houlihan, defending,
asked for a dismiss in the absence
of evidence as to the ownership of
the parts and that there was not
permission given to use them.

Deputy Justice Nunan dismissed
the case.

WAS MEMBER OF FIRST DAIL.

Mr. P. J. Moloney, who died aged
79, at his residence, Cooleen, Tip-
perary, yesterday, was a member of
the First Dail Eireann, where in
December, 1921, he adopted a strong
anti-Treaty attitude. In the general
election of 1918, when Sinn Fein de-
feated the Irish Parliamentary
Party, he was elected for South
Tipperary.

FELL FROM TREE.

Evidence that he had fallen from
a tree a distance of about 19 feet,
sustaining a fractured skull, was
given at the inquest in Cork, yes-
terday, on Michael McSweeney (13),
27 Wycherley terrace. A verdict of
accidental death was returned.

A COSTLY JOKE

At Bradford District Court yes-
terday, Patrick Wallace, 16 St. Ita's
Street, Island Field, Limerick, was
charged with taking a bicycle with-
out the consent of the owner.

Evidence was given that Patrick
Joseph Hartman, also of Limerick,
went into a house at Kilmore and
when he came out his bicycle was
gone. On the following day he got
back the bicycle.

Defendant admitted taking the
bicycle for a joke, which he thought
he was playing on a friend. The
following morning, when he looked
at the bicycle, he discovered it was
not his friend's and that he had
played the joke on the wrong man,
so he reported the matter to the
Guards. He was a shoemaker by
trade and had a large family and
pleaded for leniency.

Deputy Justice Nunan imposed
a fine of £2, with £1 11s. 6d. expen-
ses, and allowed three months to
pay.

Mrs. Katherine Moylan, of Bishop
Street, Newcastle West, Co. Lime-
rick, postmistress, who died on
April 3rd, 1946, left personal estate
in England and Eire valued at
£2,064. She left her residence to her
daughter, Anne; a house to her
daughter, Mary; and certain real
estate to her and her husband; £500
to her daughter, Margaret; £300 to
her daughter, Catherine; £200 each
to the children of her son, Dennis;
and the residue to her son-in-law,
Robert Cussen. Probate has been
granted to her daughter, Mrs. Anne
Ryan, of Bank House, Cahir.
