DIED IN PRISON

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EVIDENCE AT INQUEST

The death of Patrick Corkery (27), a native of Toureen, Croom, Co. Limerick, on Tuesday in Portlaoighise Prison, was the subject of an inquest held by Deputy Coroner Dr. T. J. McCormack at the prison last evening.

Deceased collapsed and died after he had handled an electric lamp in a boiler which he was cleaning in the prison on September 16th.

Warder F. Lynch said that when a prisoner shouted that Corkery had got an electric shock, he disconnected the cable. The light in the boiler was provided by connecting a lamp and cable with the light in the boiler-house. After the accident, witness examined the cable and found no fault in it.

A prisoner, who was working with deceased, said that Corkery asked for the light. After passing it, he (witness) put his hand on the cylinder and received a shock himself. He stuck to the boiler for a second and got a shock. He heard an exclamation from deceased, and immediately pulled the cable away from him and smashed the clip to fuse the lights. Witness had never got a shock from the lamp before.

Dr. T. J. Duane, M.O., of the Prison, said artificial respiration was begun immediately after the accident, and went on for three hours.

Dr. McGrath, State Pathologist, said there was no sign of electric burning on deceased, but there was an enlarged thymus gland, and any small shock or respiratory embarrassment might have induced asphyxia.

A verdict that death was due to respiratory failure was returned.
