FATALLY INJURED IN LONDON

News has been received by his parents of the death of Mr. John (Seanle) Healy, son of Mr. and Mrs. Michael Healy, St. Ita's Gardens, Newcastle West, who has died in London as the result of a 'bus accident (writes our Newcastle West correspondent). Aged about 22 years, deceased, at the time of his death, was serving in the merchant navy.
