## A BIG DIFFERENCE

### DEFENDANT GOT A FRIGHT!

Daniel O'Loughlin, of Caherlahan,  
got a fright at Tulla District Court  
on Thursday when he heard  
District Justice Hurley, B.L.,  
announce that he would be fined  
£63 for using an untaxed motor  
tractor, 5/- for not having a  
driving licence and a similar  
amount for not being covered by  
insurance. To the relief of the  
defendant, however, the Justice  
added that the £63 would be miti-  
gated to 10/-.

Mr. M. J. Power, solr., defended.  
Sergt. Laffan gave evidence that  
the tractor was licensed for agri-  
cultural purposes and covered by  
insurance for such only, but it had  
been used to convey turf in a trailer  
for a distance of about three miles.  
He agreed with Mr. Power that it  
was an isolated case and that there  
had been no charge for conveyance  
of the turf. Defendant had merely  
obliged a neighbour and there was  
no question of conveying turf on a  
commercial basis or making a profit  
on the transaction.
