DEATH OF DOCTOR A. MCMAHON

With deep and heartfelt regret we chronicle the demise of Dr. Anthony McMahon, The Crescent, Limerick, which took place early this morning unexpectedly. The deceased, a son of the late Mr. Hugh McMahon, timber merchant, was in his early thirties. Becoming ill during the night, he was rushed to Barrington's Hospital, where he expired. He was in his usual good health yesterday, being actively engaged in the discharge of his professional duties.

Dr. McMahon was married only five weeks ago to Dr. Cowhey, daughter of Mrs. and the late Maurice Cowhey, Rathkeale.

The news of the sudden death of Dr. McMahon, who was an extremely popular young medical practitioner, has occasioned widespread regret and sorrow. Following his graduation he was appointed House Surgeon at St. John's Hospital, where he won the golden opinions of the patients and the visiting medical staff. Quite recently he began private practice in his native city and had built up for himself a wide connection.

AFTER MANY YEARS

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DEPARTURE OF POPULAR AUCTIONEER

The departure of Mr. James Leeney, Limerick Road, Charleville, for Tipperary, where he has now taken up residence, brings to an end a long established connection with the business interests of the town (writes our Charleville correspondent). Over the half a century period a resident, during the last 40 years of which he took a keen and unselfish interest in all matters connected with the welfare of the town and its people, his assistance was always at the command of rich and poor. He succeeded his father-in-law, the late Mr. Michael Kearns, as clerk of the old Petty Sessions Court and was an esteemed and valued public servant, from which office he retired in 1922. He conducted a highly successful auctioneering business up to the time of his retirement owing to ill-health in addition to his extensive side-line in insurance, the agencies for which have now been transferred to Messrs. James Binchy and Son, solicitors, including the Scottish Provident, Hibernian, and Liverpool and London and Globe. It is interesting to note that the agency for the last mentioned was first opened in Charleville by Mr. Leeney's father-in-law, the late Mr. Kearns, in 1875, and has been in the family ever since, a period of 72 years. While the public will regret Mr. Looney's departure from the district, they will join with his many old friends and acquaintances in wishing him and Mrs. Leeney many years of health and happiness in their new surroundings.
