HUGE FUNERAL CORTEGE

The funeral of the late Dr. Anthony McMahon, The Crescent, Limerick, which took place from St. Michael's Church, after Solemn Requiem High Mass, to Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery yesterday, was of immense proportions. The cortege was fully representative of the commercial and professional classes of the city and county, and was a striking manifestation of regret and sorrow at the passing of a young medical man of acknowledged ability. A son of the late Mr. Hugh McMahon (Messrs. James McMahon, Ltd.), timber merchant, Dr. McMahon had distinguished himself in his profession, though young in years. When attached to St. John's Hospital, as house surgeon, and later as medical officer at the City Tuberculosis Hospital, he created an indelible impression, and many are the tributes paid to his memory by grateful patients.

Only five weeks ago Dr. McMahon was married to Dr. A. Cowhey, a daughter of Mrs. and the late Maurice Cowhey, Rathkeale, and to her, as well as to the other members of the family, deep and heartfelt sympathy is tendered in her great bereavement.

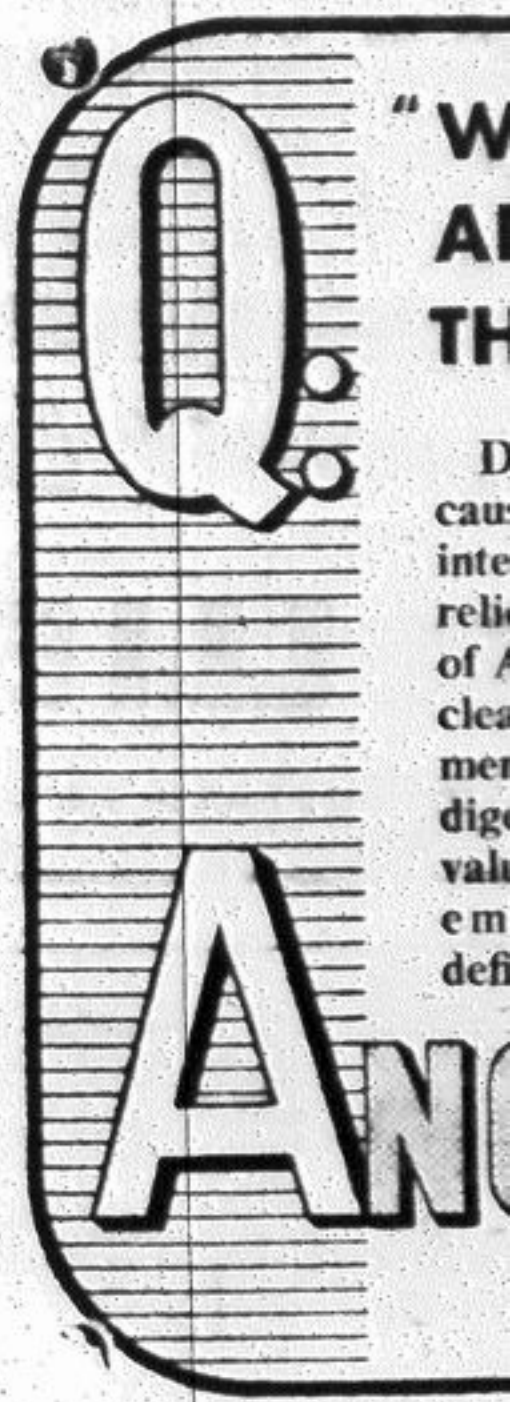
