GIRL BOUND OVER

Before District Justice D. F. Gleeson, M.A., at the Limerick District Court to-day,

Olive Joan Ryan, (c/o Mary O'Shaughnessy, 9 James Street, Limerick), was charged that she did unlawfully, by false pretences, and with intent to defraud, obtain from Frank O'Mahony, O'Connell Street, an attache case, value 14/6, and iced cake, value 3/8, from the National Bakery, The Crescent.

Inspector Griffin prosecuted and Mr. M. B. O'Malley, solicitor, entered a plea of guilty on defendant's behalf.

The Inspector explained that the defendant was at one time employed at the Alexandria Nursing Home and also at St. John's Hospital. On the date of the offences, defendant was not employed. She went to the National Bakery and informed one of the assistants that Mrs. McDonagh, of the Alexandria Nursing Home, had sent her to purchase an iced cake. The assistant complied with the request and subsequently a bill was sent to Mrs. McDonagh, who denied all knowledge of the cake got in her name. In connection with the attache case, defendant went into Frank O'Mahony's shop and got same on telling a lady assistant that it was for Rev. Mother Columbanus, St. John's Hospital. The attache case was since recovered.

Detective Garda McCarthy, in evidence, said that defendant was a native of Charleville, and had been in Limerick for a number of years. All her employers said she was an excellent girl to do work, but that she kept late hours.

The Inspector, continuing, said that defendant had been before the court on February last on a charge of obtaining goods value £1 15s. On that occasion she was given the benefit of the Probation of Offenders
