BRUFF TRADER'S DEATH

A member of a well-known busi-
ness family has passed away in the
person of Mrs. K. Raleigh, Bruff,
who died recently, at the age of
over 80 years (writes our Bruff
correspondent). She was a mem-
ber of an old-established family in
the county, and for a long number
of years she carried on a very suc-
cessful business as a licensed tra-
der and general grocer at Main St.,
Bruff. In the course of her busi-
ness she came in contact with
many people from a wide area, and
with all she was very popular, her
kind and gentle disposition appeal-
ing to all whom she met. She was
a lady of many admirable traits
and was universally popular. Her
death, even at so fine an age, is
widely regretted.

The remains were removed to
Fedamore Church from her daugh-
ter's residence where the demise
occurred, and after Solemn Re-
quiem Mass the funeral took place
to the New Cemetery, Bruff, where
the remains were interred in the
presence of a large attendance,
which was representative of the
farming, business and professional
life of the district, and was a fine
tribute to the memory of the de-
ceased, who was one of the oldest
shopkeepers in the district.
