He left the contents and equipment of the Orotory at the Palace to his successor; £225 for Masses; £250 to Annie Broderick, housekeeper, if in his service; £100 to John Horgan, coachman, if in his service; one year's wages to other servants of three year's service, and £10 to any servant of less, and half the residue to the Society for the Propagation of the Faith and the other half to the St. Vincent de Paul Society, Limerick, for the poor.

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
