HEARD A THUD

And Lights Went Out

WEST LIMERICK TRAGEDY INQUEST

The adjourned inquest touching the death of Mr. Arthur E. Switzer, Woodstock Cottage, Ballingarry, County Limerick, miller and carpenter, was opened on Tuesday evening by Coroner Michael Cussen, solicitor, Rathkeale, and a jury of whom Mr. Jeremiah Cahill was foreman (writes our Ballingarry correspondent). The late Mr. Switzer met his death by being entangled in the wheel of the Mill on November 24.

The Industrial Inspector, Seumas Ua Flaithibhin, represented the Department of Industry and Commerce.

Mr. Ernest Shine, son-in-law of deceased, swore that he helped deceased in the grinding of corn and the repairing of a spur wheel on the morning of November 24th and was finished at about 1 p.m. After dinner he went grinding corn again and the deceased went away, doing odd jobs and repairing some bicycles.

HEARD A THUD

At about 5 p.m. witness shut off the grinding mill and deceased went to his office about 25 yards away. He stayed away for about fifteen minutes. Witness next heard him going into the mill and though he did not see him he knew his footsteps. About 5.20 p.m. he heard a thud and the lights went out and he instantly realised that something had happened. He rushed into the mill and saw deceased's battery lamp lying on the floor underneath the shafting, where he saw deceased's body entangled in the shafting. His body was across the shafting and his body coat entangled in the machinery and he was bleeding from the nose and ears. The body had made the machinery stationary. Witness cut off the water, propped the machinery and partly released deceased, when he found the body coat twisted around the shafting. He had to get a knife and cut away portion of the coat to release him. He then saw Mr. Switzer was dead. He at once reported the accident to the Garda Station, Ballingarry.

A DAILY HABIT

It was a daily habit of deceased, said witness, to go into the mill, whether it was working or not, to inspect the machinery and see if the cogs were meshing properly. The deceased was in poor health for some time and was under the care of Dr. Costelloe, Adare, in 1946.

Garda Morgan Dowling, Ballingarry, stated that he visited the scene of the tragedy and found deceased dead and lying on his back on the ground beside the pulley wheel of the shafting. He examined the shafting and found traces of blood on it. The machinery was stationary and he saw a body coat entangled in the shafting. He saw that the coat was cut. Mr. Shine informed him that he released the deceased and laid him on the ground.

The Coroner then read the evidence given by Dr. W. Lane, Ballingarry, at the opening of the inquest on November 25th.

JURY'S VERDICT.

The jury found that deceased died from shock and haemorrhage of the lungs and that his death was accidental.

The Inspector said he wished to be associated with the vote of sympathy passed to the widow and family of deceased on the previous occasion.
