their loans over such a comparatively short period, and the rate of interest is so high, that their help does little or nothing to ease the problem.

I suggest that the time has arrived when the Local Government Department should seriously tackle this problem, and unless the Government provides the local authorities with a much more substantial subsidy than is at present available or, alternatively, allow contractors an economic subsidy when they engage in building houses of the type I have in mind, the salaried classes have no prospect of obtaining houses for another decade or two at the rate things are moving.—Signed,
