It is with very deep regret we announce the death of Mr. Denis McCormack, which took place at his residence, Attyvrega, Cullen, Co. Tipperary, on 14th November. The deceased, who was highly respected in the district, was of a kind and genial disposition and was beloved by all he came in contact with and his loss is deeply mourned. He was Chairman of Sarsfield Co-operative Creamery, Ballyneety, and member of the Committee there for many years. He was brother of the late Fathers Michael and Timothy McCormack, P.P.s, Montana, U.S.A.

plied to grain imports. He saw no reason why the Government could not start an industry in Foynes, as it had done elsewhere. He referred to an industry started in Askeaton four or five years ago.

Mr. Fitzsimons ended by assuring the people of Foynes that he would do everything in his power as a County Councillor to help.

Mr. Jackson, Chairman of the Foynes Branch of the I.T. & G.W.U., speaking on behalf of the workers, said he had listened with great interest to Mr. O'Brien and Mr. Fitzsimons and felt quite sure that they had both attended the meeting with the sole purpose of doing their utmost to help. He agreed with Mr. Sheehan's statement that the question of finding a suitable type of industry needed time for consideration, but as unemployment was so great in the district he felt that immediate relief could be given if representation was made to Timber Importers, Ltd., with a view to having cargoes of timber imported through Foynes for distribution in Kerry and elsewhere.

GOOD FACILITIES.

Continuing, Mr. Jackson said there was ample accommodation in Foynes convenient to the railway for storing at least 600 standards of timber, and the harbour fees on ships using the port, plus the rate of pay to men employed on discharging such ships, were lower than those prevailing in Limerick, Cork or Dublin.

Mr. O'Brien agreed that the suggestion was worth trying and promised to take the necessary steps in the matter.

Mr. Gavin asked if there was any foundation in a rumour which was circulated in Foynes, that any would-be purchasers of the saw mills could be debarred, by a clause operating in the sale, from operating the business as a saw mills again.

No information was available on this point.

Referring to the statement made by Mr. Fitzsimons about an industry which was started in Askeaton, and which has since made good progress, Mr. O'Brien said that it was local capital which put that going. The Government, he said, won't start an industry of that type unless local capital is provided—that is the question. The same applies to the setting up of an industry there.

RECENT DEATH

MR. W. F. O'DONNELL, BRUREE

The people of Bruree learned with regret of the death, which occurred in Dublin last week, of Mr. William F. O'Donnell, late of Bruree (writes our Bruree correspondent). The late Mr. O'Donnell carried on a very extensive and successful general grocery and spirit business in Bruree for upwards of thirty years, until his retirement, owing to ill-health, just a year ago, when he disposed of his property. In his business dealings, he won the esteem and respect of all. He was a prominent member of the Bruree Parish Council and took an active part as a member of the Bruree L.S.F. during the Emergency.

Son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Michael O'Donnell, Oldtown, Hospital, he was a member of an old and respected farming family and his demise is regretted all over County Limerick, where the family is well known. He was brother of Mr. David B. O'Donnell, merchant, Croom, and of Mr. Patrick O'Donnell, who farms extensively at Oldtown, Hospital.

His remains were removed from Dublin to Hospital Church on Thursday of last week and following Requiem Mass there on Friday the interment took place in the adjoining cemetery in the presence of a very large and most representative attendance.

heating of the Institution the abnormally cold spell had cost the Board a considerable sum. In addition, the price this year had gone up by 1 to 6/- per ton. The total in these items would amount to £2,500.

FUEL QUESTION.

In connection with the fuel, the Manager said that this year made provision such emergency during the spring as had occurred this year and had bought extra allocated coal which would carry them forward to July or August. The price of this purchase was included in the figure made for fuel.

"The total over-expenditure will be £8,000," went on the Manager. "It is quite possible that the total will not come anywhere near that amount. The position is that though our receipts tend to be less than I will have to get your permission to expend this extra amount."

Mr. Sean Hayes, Co.C., and Mr. P. H. Donegan seconded, that the Manager required permission to exceed the expenditure set out in the report by the amount specified by the Manager.

The Manager added that, though he did not like making any estimate at the moment, he believed the estimate for the coming year would be increased.

Mr. Donegan—That is not expected.

THE FARMS.

Referring to the general condition of the Institution and its farms, the Manager considered that the Board should provide a more up-to-date yard, in which they could breed pig breeding to a great extent. Cowsheds were also necessary on a farm attached to such an institution, and he would like the Board to consider at the meeting the possibility of forming a committee to inquire into the suggestion there that day report its findings back to the Board in due course.

The Mayor (Mr. P. O'Brien) who presided in the absence of the Chairman (Mr. R. M. Clery) agreed that this should be done and it was unanimously agreed that the Manager's suggestions should be put on the agenda for the next meeting.

RECOUPMENT OF OUTLAY.

Replying to a question put by G. B. Dillon, B.C., the Manager said that even though the Board had ahead with improvements on the farms and yards attached to the Institution, forgetting for the moment the possibility of the work paid for by Swallow funds, a successful application for recoupment of outlay could be made. The necessary application for financial assistance had been made for the proposition of the new nurse and for the replacement by new buildings of the present structures, particularly the shops. It was not very clear to them in regard to the assistance from the Sweeps of the position arising out of the new Health Act and its frequently improved health but he could state that the Hospitals were the first in this country to benefit from the Hospitals Trust.

The Board unanimously agreed that the Manager's statement should be decided unanimously to further consider the matters raised with a view to discussing at a later meeting a suggestion that the funds should be improved.

PRESENTATION TO OFFICIAL

The transfer of Mr. P. J. O'Donnell, Provincial Bank, Killaloe, Co. Sligo, is very regretted by his large circle of friends in the Killaloe area.
