## ADJOURNED INQUEST TO BE RESUMED

An adjourned inquest concerning the death of James Foley (75), Lickadoon, Ballysheedy, Co. Limerick, will be re-opened on Wednesday next in the County Infirmity.

At the previous hearing of evidence, Thomas Foley, son of the deceased, deposed that his father was in the best of health prior to having been knocked down by a lorry near Knockea Cross on the 21st August.

Medical evidence was given that when the deceased was admitted to the County Infirmity he was suffering from shock and semi-consciousness, and had a lacerated wound on the left elbow, the right arm was swollen and discoloured, and there was a fracture of the lower end of the humerus. It was certified that death was due to cardiac failure and uraemia following the accident.
