DEATH OF MRS. J. SHEAHAN, BALLYGUILTENANE

On Christmas Eve, December 24th, Mrs. Michael Sheahan, of Ballyguilteneane, Glin, Co. Limerick, died at her home.

The deceased, who had been ill for some time past, was in perfect health up to about six months ago. She had been treated at an hospital in Limerick and had the constant attendance of Dr. Barrett, of Glin.

She was the daughter of the late John Sheahan, of Knocknagorna, Athea, and Mary O'Connor, from Rathoran. She was a most popular woman and endeared herself to all who knew her, and was a particular favourite with the poor and oppressed.

Besides her husband, she is survived by four sons—John and Patrick, who are in the old home; Michael, a Creamery Manager in Manister, Co. Limerick, and Thomas, who is an Agricultural Supervisor, now stationed in Ballinamore, Co. Leitrim.

The wake and funeral were largely attended by sympathising relatives and friends, many coming from her old parish in Athea. After reposing in the church in Glin, the interment took place in the Sheahan plot in Kilfergus Cemetery. Mass was offered in the Parish Church by the pastor, Father Carroll, who, with the curate, officiated at the grave also.

Her two brothers, Michael and John Sheahan, of Knocknagorna, her sisters, Katherine Dee, Mrs. Mortimer Sheahan and Bridget Sheahan, were all in attendance.

Her husband, and brother-in-law, Patrick, sons and brothers and sisters, as well as her brother-in-law in New York, John J. Sheahan, who was there for ten weeks in 1946, have the sympathy of all who knew them and her.

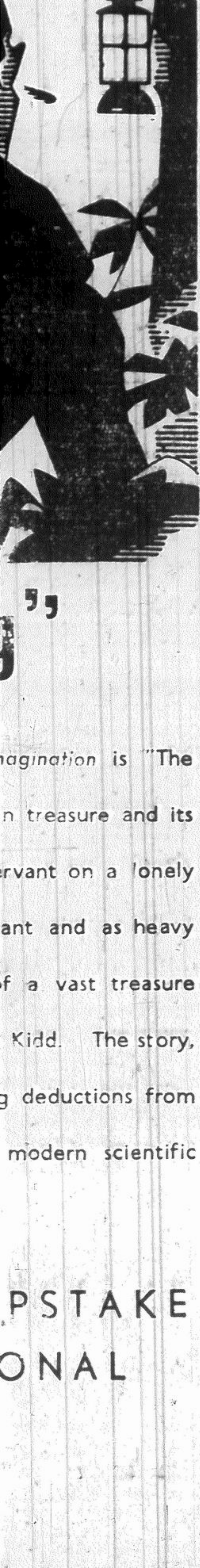
