DIES IN NEW YORK

The death took place in December
last, at the Frances Shervier Home
for the Aged, Riverdale, New York,
of Mrs. Maria Glover, a native and
at one time a well known business
personality of Croom (writes our
Croom correspondent). Up to thirty
years ago, the late Mrs. Glover had
carried on business in Bridge Street
and was the owner of considerable
house property in Croom, including
the present Garda Station. Her
brother, James J. Ryan, a prominent
Brooklyn pawnbroker, brought her
to the United States some twelve
years ago. She resided in New
Jersey until eighteen months ago,
when she went to Shervier Home,
where she died at the fine age of 95.

In addition to Mr. Ryan she is
survived by a niece and four grand-
nieces.
