EJECTMENT ACTION.

Annie Clancy and Elizabeth McNamara, Keeper View Terrace, Limerick, brought ejectment proceedings on notice to quit in respect of one room, against Mrs. Bridget O'Callaghan, 53, Edward Street, Limerick.

Mr. D. J. O'Malley, solicitor, appeared for the plaintiffs, and the defendant was not professionally represented.

George O'Brien said that he served a copy of a Notice to Quit on the defendant, and demanded possession on the 29th December.

Daniel O'Regan, agent for the property, said that the rent was £6 per week, and the total rent due was £1 18s. 6d.

To His Worship—The defendant said that the "rain was down on her and the room was in a terrible state." She admitted that rent was due and this amounted to about 10 weeks, at 3/6 per week.

The Justice was informed that there was no agreement made with the landlords for the carrying out of repairs.

The defendant said that there were very little repairs to be done. Mr. O'Regan said that he offered to allow a week's rent to the defendant for the carrying out of repairs. The case was brought because the tenants in the house took on themselves to pay the rent whenever they wished.

Remarking that the parties should come to some agreement, the Justice gave a decree for possession.
