ORDER VARIED

The Judge said he attributed the distinction made by the D.J. between Carmody and the appellant to Walsh's previous conviction on a similar charge. He was not disposed to send Walsh to prison, as he considered a substantial fine would meet the case. He would affirm the conviction of the Justice but would vary the order and would impose a fine of £10, to be paid within one month, or, in default, Walsh would have to serve the term of imprisonment imposed on him in the Court below.

ORDER FOR PAYMENT

At the Equity sittings of Limerick Circuit Court, before Judge Barra O Briain, S.C.,

Michael S. Carroll, Ballygibba, Kilmallock, sought the payment out of funds lodged to his credit in the Bank of Ireland by Limerick Co. Council, amounting to £20 3s. 4d., in respect of the compulsory purchase of portion of his lands at Kilballyowen.

Mr. G. Lee, B.L. (instructed by Messrs. R. Fox and Co., solicitors), appeared for the applicant, on whose affidavit he formally moved.

The Judge ordered the payment out of the sum mentioned.

Mr. M. F. Noonan, solr., appeared for the County Council and said he had no objection to the making of the order applied for.

WOULD TAX EXCESS PROFITS.

Remarks:—Driest month was August, with 1.18 inches, most of which fell on the 1st day of the month; otherwise it would have been one of the best months during the past 20 years. June was the wettest with an abnormal amount of rain fall on the 28th, namely, 1.58 inches. Other heavy falls were on August 1st with 1.00, and September 14th, 1.25 inches, respectively.
