OBITUARY

MR. W. LYNCH, ROSSA VILLAS

The unexpected death of Mr. William Lynch, 5 Rossa Villas, on the 6th February, came as an unexpected shock to his numerous friends and relatives in Limerick City and County. His passing recalls to those who knew him, what has now passed into history—the turbulent days in Ireland from 1916 to 1921. In his position as a member of the old City Night Watch, he rendered invaluable services to the I.R.A. Movement. He was a member of the 2nd Battalion since its inception. Like the late Tim Hennessy and Will Connors, of Killonan, who gave their lives and all they possessed, of whom he was a relative, he never severed his allegiance to teachings of Wolfe Tone, the Fenians and Eamonn de Valera, and continued so up to the time of his untimely death. His funeral, on Sunday, 8th February, was of large, imposing dimensions. The coffin, draped in the Tri-colour, was borne from St. John's Cathedral to the hearse by a guard of honour of the St. John Ambulance Brigade. The cortege through the city bore eloquent testimony to the esteem in which he was held.
