### NEW SUPERANNUATION ACT

A letter was received from the  
Secretary of the Vocational  
Officers' Association drawing at-  
tention to the provisions of the  
new Superannuation Act and, par-  
ticularly, to the clause in the Act  
providing that committees could  
review the pensions given by them  
to their retired staffs between  
1947 and 1950.

"We would be concerned with  
the case of **Miss O'Neill**," re-  
marked the **C.E.O.** "We awarded  
her a pension subject to any re-  
view that we would be empowered  
to make, later. Copies of the Act  
are not yet available, but I have  
ordered one. I think we should not  
do anything until we have the  
printed copy of the Act."

Questioned by members, the  
**C.E.O.** said he could definitely state  
that the new Act would mean an  
increase in pension for the persons  
concerned.

The Committee unanimously  
adopted the suggestion of the **C.E.O.**  
that the matter be deferred until a  
copy of the Act had been procured.

### ENGINEERING TEACHERS.

A letter was received from the  
Irish Engineers' Association asking  
the co-operation of the Committee  
in the Association's attempt to get  
the Department to sanction an in-  
crease of fifty per cent. in the  
hourly rates of salary being paid to  
part-time teachers of engineering in  
the technical schools.

In reply to questions, the **C.E.O.**  
said that the present rate being paid  
was 7/3 an hour.

The Committee unanimously de-  
cided to record that the members  
were in agreement that the Depart-  
ment should give the Engineers'  
Association's application sympathetic  
consideration.
