## Final Day At Clonmel

### THE CLASSICS DECIDED

Conditions were again ideal at Powerstown Park, Clonmel, to-day, for the final day of the National Coursing meeting. There was again another big attendance when proceedings got under way.

The fifth round of the Derby opened with a major upset when Contango was beaten by Cromptawn Monarch. Contango was slowly away, but made up a lot of ground. In a thrilling race for the first turn, it appeared that Contango had just got there. However, the judge, Mr. M. Davin, thought otherwise, and the flag went to Cromptawn Monarch.

Town Crier and Musketeer provided another great set-to. The latter got unsighted and was well beaten thereafterwards. Mr. Delaney, Co. Meath, had some compensation for the defeat of Contango when Royal Tremolo beat the favourite, Little Voices, to earn his way to the final. This was another very close struggle. Royal Tremolo just held on to lead by the narrowest of margins and Little Voices challenged three-quarters of the way up.

In the Oaks, there were further upsets when Derg Shaggy beat Empress Roisin, and Badge of Munster wore down the fancied Daisy Packer, to lead half a length and prove better before puss got away. The favourite, Cannot Give, ran a stylish course against Dark Rose, leading five lengths and killing with a lightning drive.

In the end the Derby went to Mr. E. Delaney, Trimroy, Co. Meath, with Royal Tremolo. The Oaks went to Cannot Give, while French Rebel, as expected, took the International Cup.
