TOOK LORRY TO FAIR

AND CARRIED CATTLE FOR REWARD

At Ennis District Court on Friday, William McNamara, Dereen, Fanore, North Clare, was charged with carrying merchandise without a licence and not being covered by insurance. His father, Joseph McNamara, shopkeeper, same address, was charged as owner of the lorry, and Patrick Burke, Barbane, Broadford, was also charged for having hired the lorry.

Supt. J. G. Flynn, who prosecuted, said William McNamara took the lorry to the fair of Corofin and solicited the carriage of cattle for reward. Burke engaged him for £3 to take the cattle from Corofin to Broadford, and he did so without a merchandise licence, as a result of which his insurance cover was not operative.

Mr. I. M. Houlihan, solr., defending, admitted the offence and said that McNamara, who was only 22 years of age, had not realised the gravity of the offence in regard to the insurance not being effective when he had not a merchandise licence. He had a very good character and would not be again before the Court.

District Justice Hurley said that although the case had been met in a very candid manner, it was still a very serious case. He imposed a fine of £12 on William McNamara and applied the Probation Act to the other two defendants.
