I also pointed out that the other public hospitals are unable to admit patients, who have to remain on a waiting list, with very often serious results. We are hoping that something special will be done during the coming year in this respect.

FOOD PRODUCTION.

I have referred each year to the question of food production. The responsible authorities have done everything to bring home to everybody the necessity of contributing to the national effort. There are many plots available at Limerick, and with the encouragement given by the Corporation all the available ground should be utilised. In fact, it would be criminal to allow any of the plots to remain uncultivated.

We are anxious, as always, to have a better representation of the City Council, and hope that when the next municipal election comes round we will succeed in increasing our membership. Our present members have given good service and

DUBLIN CATTLE MARKET

BRISK TRADE TO-DAY

Dublin victuallers maintained their attitude of refusing to pay more than 90/- per cwt. (l.w.) for heifers and bullocks at the Dublin Cattle Market to-day, when prices were much the same as last week. Victuallers, however, secured their requirements at something like their own figure. In exceptional cases—when good store cattle came up for sale—they paid limited prices, but never went more than 92/- or 93/-.

Dutch, Northern Ireland and cross-Channel buyers were in attendance and trade was brisk with good clearances. Dutch buyers were keen on securing feeding bulls and good heavy cows; while a good quantity of outfeds were bought for export to Britain.

The actual figures for the market were:—Cattle, 2,809; and sheep, 3,604.

IN PALESTINE

ELEVEN KILLED TO-DAY

As a result of a heavy explosion which took place in Haifa to-day, eleven Arabs, including two Arab policemen, were killed and 27 people injured. Immediately after the explosion, which incidentally shook the city, heavy rifle gun-fire broke out.
