**MYSTERY REPORT**

**DISTURBS CHARLEVILLE  
RESIDENTS**

Early on Sunday morning, shortly  
before 3 o'clock, the residents of  
Charleville had their slumbers dis-  
turbed by a report resembling an  
explosion in the vicinity of the  
town (writes our Charleville corres-  
pondent). The noise caused some-  
thing akin to consternation and  
members of the local Gardai, in-  
cluding Sergt. Duggan, turned out  
to make investigations, but could  
find nothing amiss, after patrolling  
all roads leading to the town. While  
various theories are advanced as to  
the cause of the report, enquiries  
made in various quarters have so  
far failed to elucidate the matter,  
which is still shrouded in mystery.

**LOSS TO MERCY ORDER**

**DEATH OF AGED NUN**

The death took place at the  
Convent of Mercy, Charleville, on  
Tuesday morning of Mother Mary  
Alphonsus Henebery, after an  
illness of some two or three months  
(writes our Charleville correspon-  
dent). The deceased, who was over  
70 years of age, bore her illness with  
characteristic patience and resig-  
nation and her death is a big loss  
to the Community. She had a long  
association with the Charleville  
Convent, extending up to 40 years,  
and was a lady of rare administra-  
tive abilities, of high educational  
attainments and of edifying  
humility. She was much devoted  
to the work of the Children of Mary

**BOTH GET JAIL**

**DEFENDANTS FAILED TO  
PAY**

A fortnight ago, when two men,  
Patrick Moore, Killina, Carbury,  
Kildare, and Martin Kearney, Tick-  
nivis, Carbury, were convicted, at  
Limerick District Court, on a joint  
charge of having maliciously dam-  
aged the licensed premises of Mar-  
garet Downey, Bank Place, Lime-  
rick, Mr. Dermot F. Gleeson, D.J.,  
released them on condition that  
they would jointly compensate Mrs.  
Downey for the £6 worth of damage  
they had done to her shop.

To-day at the District Court, In-  
spector Griffin, for the prosecution,  
said he understood the amount had  
not been paid and, in fact, nothing  
had been heard of it.

Mr. D. J. O'Malley, solr., who  
originally appeared for the defen-  
dants, said he had heard nothing  
from either of the two during the  
fortnight.

The Justice said he had no alter-  
native to sending the defendants to  
jail. He imposed a sentence of 21  
days imprisonment on each, with  
hard labour.

**HEARD MONEY JINGLING**

When Cornelius Ryan, publican,  
Galbally, was charged at Kilfinane  
Court with a breach of the licens-  
ing laws, Sergeant McDermott said  
that on the occasion in question,  
7th November, he heard money  
jingling as if being put into a till.  
A fine of 11/- was imposed on de-  
fendant, for whom Mr. W. McCar-  
thy, solicitor, appeared, and a man  
found on the premises was fined  
20/-. The Court was exceptionally  
light, lasting less than half an  
hour.

**SHAMROCK TO BRITAIN**
