NEAR CITY 'BUS STOPS

The inconvenience caused to
'buses by private motorists parking
their vehicles near 'bus stops was
stressed by District Justice D. F.
Gleeson, when, at Limerick District
Court to-day, a number of such
offenders were charged with park-
ing cars within 20 feet of stops.

Inspector Griffin said that 'bus
drivers had great difficulty in park-
ing at stops because of the action
of private motorists parking too
near them.

Nominal fines were imposed in
all cases, and a warning was issued
that these might be increased in
future.

FISH PLENTIFUL

NO QUEUES IN DUBLIN

For the first time in five months,
there were no queues at Dublin fish
shops to-day, as a result of im-
proved quantities of fish of all the
popular varieties, in excellent con-
dition. Our Dublin correspondent

fish, which were sold at consider-
ably reduced prices, was the result
of the mild, calm weather, which
enabled all fishermen to reach fish-
ing grounds and share a good har-
