AND CARRIED CATTLE REWARD

At Ennis District Court on day, William McNamara, Der. Fanore, North Clare, was charged with carrying merchandise without a licence and not being covered by insurance. His father, Joseph McNamara, shopkeeper, same address, was charged as owner of lorry, and Patrick Burke, Barba Broadford, was also charged having hired the lorry.

Supt. J. G. Flynn, who prosecuted, said William McNamara took lorry to the fair of Corofin and solicited the carriage of cattle without reward. Burke engaged him for to take the cattle from Corofin Broadford, and he did so without merchandise licence, as a result which his insurance cover was operative.

Mr. I. M. Houlihan, solr., defending, admitted the offence and said that McNamara, who was only years of age, had not realised the gravity of the offence in regard to the insurance not being effected when he had not a merchandise licence. He had a very good character and would not be again before the Court.

District Justice Hurley said that although the case had been met in a very candid manner, it was still a very serious case. He imposed a fine of £12 on William McNamara and applied the Probation Act to the other two defendants.
