EXTENSION LECTURE

As may be seen from an adver-
tising column, the third of this
season's Royal Dublin Society's
Extension Lectures will be given
at the Technical Institute on Fri-
day next at 8 p.m. The lecturer on
this occasion is Captain Donal B.
O'Connell, K.M., M.R.I.A. Captain
O'Connell, who is a great-grand
nephew of the "Liberator," joined
the British Navy as a cadet in 1906
and retired in 1936. During his
naval career he served in many

or eight years in China. In the
