A brilliant goal by Jim Fitzgerald, followed by a point by his brother Paddy, levelled up matters and when Anthony Shanny got through for another goal, St. Patricks were in the lead. Tommy Ryan, who played a brilliant game for Thurles on the right-wing, was responsible for some lovely points but an even first-half saw the visitors enjoy the minimum interval lead on the score 2-4 to 2-3.

Ryan equalised for Thurles on resuming and Doyle put them a goal in front soon after. The Limerick reply came immediately. Jim Fitzgerald going through for the equaliser at the other end.
