THE QUARTERLY MEETING

CHARLEVILLE FAIR

Charleville fair was small, with an advance in prices from previous fairs. Three year old bullocks, £35 to £45; two year olds, £20 to £30; yearling bullocks, £12 to £20; yearling heifers, £14 to £18; good beef scarce and dear; about 200 in-calf heifers and dairy cows were practically all sold at prices ranging from £25 to £50 each; fat hoggets, from £7 10s. to £8 10s.; store pigs, £6 to £8.

There was a small supply of fat pigs at Wednesday's market, 15 being purchased. Ruling price, £10 per cwt. (d.w.). Bonhams and stores were in good demand, the latter making from £6 to £8, and in some cases £9.

A FINE TYPE PASSES

It is with deep regret that the death is announced of Mr. Patrick J. Carroll, of Ballinaculla, Sherin's Cross, Kilmallock, at the very early age of 23 years (writes our Bruff correspondent). Only son of Mrs. E. Carroll and the late Mr. N. Carroll, deceased young man had been ailing only for a short time before his demise, which came as a great shock to his family and a wide circle of friends. A gifted young man in all respects, he was a model farmer and a prominent member of the Kilmallock Young Farmers Club. His loss will be felt by the Parish of Dromin as well as by his many friends, as he was ever ready to assist wherever he could. He was a member of the L.D.F. during the Emergency and a member of the Dromin Red Cross. An excellent dramatic actor, he was a prominent member of the Dromin Dramatic Class in the plays staged by this Society. He was cousin of Rev. John Kennedy, C.C., St. Mary's Limerick.

His remains were removed to Dromin Church, on Friday evening of last week, and on Saturday, Solemn Requiem Mass was celebrated there.

A fine tribute to his memory was paid at the funeral, which took place afterwards to the family burial ground at Dromin. It was one of the largest ever seen in Dromin, bearing testimony to the esteem in which the deceased young man was held and the popularity which he enjoyed. His colleagues in the Kilmallock Young Farmers' Club bore the remains to the graveside. To his bereaved mother, sister and relatives, the sympathy of all was extended on the untimely and poignant death of the young man. Scenes of profound sympathy were witnessed at the graveside.

Ballymurta House and Lands So for £3,700 and Commission. WEEKLY FAT STOCK MARKET TUESDAY, APRIL 20th.

The entry at to-day's market showed a considerable increase in the entry of sheep. The number of cattle on offer showed a decrease as compared with last week and did not include any heavy, well finished lots. Buyers were in good attendance. Bidding for the sheep was again quiet, and sales were effected where vendors accepted prices which would show a decrease of from 10/- to 15/- per head compared with recent quotations. At this level sales were easily effected, only a few lots out of the heavy entry remaining unsold. Fat sheep best, £8 17s. 6d. to £9 5s.; second best, £8 5s. to £8 10s.; small, £7 to £7 15s. Fat cattle, medium weights, £40 to £41; seconds, £36 to £38; store heifers, £26 to £28.—Louis de Courcy, Auctioneer.
