In his presidential address, Lord Dunraven said:—I am glad, indeed, to meet you on this, the 19th anniversary of the establishment of our Society. It is very satisfactory to see so many ladies present, which is a proof, if proof be needed, of the interest they take in our meetings (hear, hear).

You will see from the report of the Management Committee that our Show last year was in every respect a signal success. We were lucky in having two remarkably fine days, the attendance was good, and the result showed a profit of £338. The entries totalled 2,352, 120 less than the previous year, but this is to be accounted for largely by a drop in the fruit classes of the Horticultural Section owing to the bad weather in the early part of the year, as well as fewer entries in the Homecraft Section, which we have every hope of making good this year. On the other hand, all the stalls in the Arcade were let, which they had not been for some time past, and the Dog Show on the second day was most successful, thanks largely to the help we received from the Limerick and District Canine Society, the entries being 587.

HORTICULTURAL SECTION.

The high reputation of the Horticultural Section was fully maintained. The decorative flower classes were especially good, and for this and the general management of the section great credit is due to Mr. Wallace, as well as to Lady Adare, the chairman of the committee concerned.
