## Suspensions And Pleas For Reinstatement

### GLIN CLUB'S STRONG APPEAL

#### After Goes To Munster Council

Patrick O'Reilly, Vice-Chairman, presided at a meeting of the Glin County Board, G.A.A., at the Gaelic League Hall, on Saturday last. Officials in attendance were Mr. Fitzgibbon, Hon. Treasurer; Mr. Sean Cunningham, Secretary.

A letter was read from the Secretary of the Co. Limerick Fets Club, dated July 11th, in which a closed date, as on that date, was given for the Fets to be held at the Secretary of the Fets Club that no fixtures be made in the west of the county on July 11th.

The Chairman suggested that the matter be left to the discretion of the County Secretary, Mr. Jack L. Moynihan.

The suggestion was unanimously accepted.

**RED CROSS OFFER.**  
The Limerick Branch of the Irish Red Cross Society wrote offering money and crew for all matches in the county. The Chairman remarked that it was a great idea to have the Red Cross. Mr. Fitzgibbon said he wondered if the presence of an ambulance at matches would be a good thing. The delegates expressed the opinion that the idea of an ambulance to the grounds would in any way be a bad advertisement for the games.

Mr. Moynihan (Ahane) expressed the opinion that the possible acceptance of the Red Cross offer would interfere with the St. John Ambulance Brigade, which had at service to the G.A.A. The Chairman considered that it was better to leave the matter in the hands of the County Secretary.

**PLAYERS SUSPENDED.**  
A report of Lieut. Simon, referee of the senior football Adare on the 11th April, at Abbeyfeale and Treaty, was read, and it was as follows: "The game was played in a rain-soaked atmosphere, leaving none too pleasant. Early in the game it was necessary to remove two players (two named in the report) who seem to think that the football pitch is a football pitch. When players realise that the game is not so, and when the referee has agreed to by both sides, the referee should have his decisions. It is then only will spectators for football and good football."

The Chairman said that the report was a pleasant reading and that the referee from each side was in agreement that they be suspended for one month.

The suggestion was unanimously accepted without discussion.

**QUESTION OF TRANSFER.**  
A letter was read from the County Board of the Clare Co. Board asking the Board to ratify the transfer of the well-known County hurler, Paddy McCarthy, to the Limerick County Board.

Cup teams were under the jurisdiction of the City Board. The juvenile team representing the county to play Dublin at Croke Park would be picked by the City Board.

It was agreed to reply to the Secretary of the Granagh team pointing out that the matter was under the jurisdiction of the City Board.

#### SOUGHT REINSTATEMENT OF GLIN PLAYERS.

Mr. P. Conway and two other officials of the Glin Club sought the reinstatement of two of their players who were suspended for twelve months arising out of incidents on the field of play. The suspensions took place about six months ago.

Mr. Conway said that the players concerned were extremely sorry for what had taken place and they were anxious to return to the team again. He attended the Board meeting that day with the hope that it would be possible to have the two players reinstated. Without them they would be put to the pin of their collar to field a team. He was making, on behalf of the Club, a special appeal to the Board, and in so doing they were offering their apologies for the incidents which led to their players' suspension.

The Chairman said that they were sorry that the rules had to be complied with and the players suspended for twelve months. He did not think that the Board had power to reinstate the players, especially as they had served only half their term of suspension.

Mr. Conway said that the players had served something over six months and that was probably the best part of the sentence.

Chairman—I'm afraid it would take a higher body than the Board to reduce the suspension, and I believe myself that this Board has no power to do that. I would like, however, to give you permission to have the question raised at the Munster Council meeting, which is now taking place.

Mr. Conway—Would it be in order if you recommended our case to the Munster Council?

Mr. Moynihan (Ahane) said that the only time to make such applications for reinstatement was before Easter.

#### THE REFEREE'S REPORT.

Mr. Fitzgibbon considered that the Glin Club's application would not be entertained by the Munster Council, because if the referee's report went before the Council they probably would not give them a hearing. As the matter was very serious, the Munster Council would not deal with it without the referee's report.

The Chairman said the best advice he could give the Glin delegates was to see the Chairman of the Munster Council and he would tell them if their application could be entertained.

Mr. Conway said that if they had not the services of the players in question they would not be able to field a team on the following day, and the matter was of great urgency.
