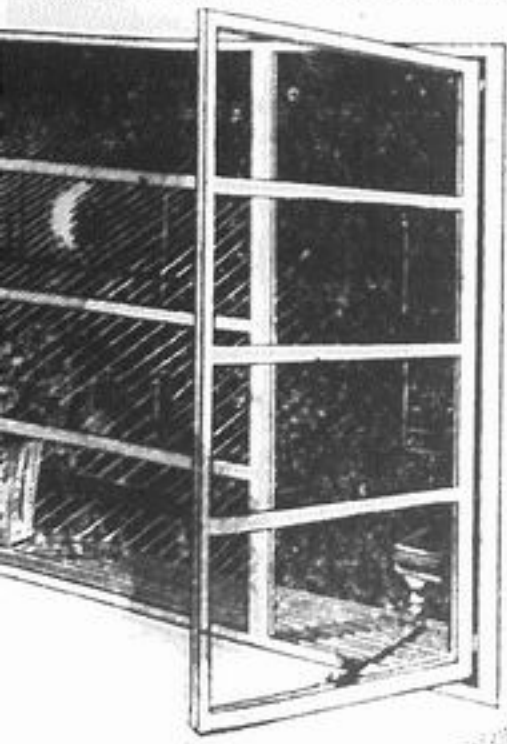

THE PADDOCKS, LIMERICK.

**WEEKLY CATTLE AND SHEEP
MARKET.**

Wednesday, May 12th—Cattle—Entries showed a substantial increase, one of the heaviest markets of the season. There was an exceptionally large attendance, many from a distance, and some for the first time, with shipping interests being fully represented. In beef section increased entries, with a large percentage of prime heifers and bullocks; on the whole quality in this section hardly up to the high standard of last week; medium weighted bullocks and heifers met active and strong demand, at about late rates, and nicely fed small heifers also in keen request; top rates being freely paid. Heifer cows again in strong demand, but secondary and older classes not so much in favour, and met a quieter market at slightly easier rates. In beef section business was steady, with maintained rates, and a particularly good clearance effected. Cows, suitable for canning, met a steady sale. Forward and aged stores were freely bid for, and changed hands at dearer rates; more of this class could have been sold, choice bullocks making up to £44; quality and condition in strong demand. In young store cattle section choice drafts of bullocks and heifers were readily sold, rates favouring vendors, and useful commercial cattle changed hands at dearer rates. Nicely bred yearlings in good demand, with steady sale for useful lots. In the store section some vendors put very extreme reserves on their cattle. A particularly good clearance effected, and the volume of business transacted being the second highest ever at the Paddocks. Fat heifers and bullocks, best, £48 10s. to £53; second run, £40 to £46 10s.; small, £31 10s. to £38 10s. Fat cows, best, £47 to £55; second run, £39 to £45; others, £30 10s. to £38 10s. Old, £14 10s. to £26 10s. 2 1/2 year old bullocks and heifers, best, £38 to £44; second run, £28 10s. to £36. 2 year old bullocks and heifers, best, £28 to £36; second run, £17 to £25 15s. Yearlings, best, £15 10s. to £17. Small heifers, £9 15s. to £11 10s.

Sheep—Record entry for spring season in this department, 750 penned, and with a large percentage of prime wethers and hoggets on sale. Strong attendance of buyers from a wide area. Trade opened strong, with brisk demand for prime wethers and hoggets, which were freely bid for at full top current rates, and advanced rates being paid for extra choice pens. Well fed sheep with quality wanted and quickly taken up, secondary sheep and those short of condition also met a better market at slightly dearer rates. Nice entry of store hoggets, forward stores met
