CASTLE WEST 'PHONE SERVICE

CAHERGUILLAMORE ROAD PROJECT

Sir—The reply to Mr. Keyes, which appeared in last week's issue, draws my attention to the new road at Caherguillamore. Are you aware that my lands are to be confiscated? This is an injustice which is imposed on me by the pressure on the County Council.

ment. Supt. Cooney said that there was no licence taken out for the first quarter of the year, although the car was used in March.
