### DOMESTIC ECONOMY.

It was proposed by Mr. McQuane, and seconded by Mr. Whelan, to have the basic rate and expenses increased by 50 per cent.

This was unanimously agreed to.

### LATE MR. J. J. WALSH

Our Dublin correspondent wires—The will of the late Mr. J. J. Walsh has been admitted to probate. He left £126,555. A sum of £37,400 has been paid in respect of death duties.

In his will he left a sum of £7,500, free of all duties, to the Lord Mayor of Dublin for the erection of a memorial to the men of 1916. He recommended that the memorial be erected in the Dublin Mountains, overlooking Dun Laoghaire.

### SILAGE MAKING IN SOUTH LIMERICK

Many farmers in South Limerick have been busy for some days engaged in the work of cutting fresh grass for the making of A.I.V. silage (writes our Bruff correspondent). In many farms cuttings have been made for the making of silage under this system, which is becoming increasingly popular in the country and is now commanding the attention of the authorities. It is regarded as the only successful method of making silage. Some silage made under this system last year was fed during the recent winter and proved an excellent foodstuff for cattle of all descriptions, and the percentage of wastage in the silo pit is almost negligible, due to the treatment of the young grass, when the silage is being made, with acid.
