**MET CIVIL BILL OFFICER**

**AND IT COST HIM £5**

When Joseph Clune, a farmer re- siding on a ninety acre farm at Ordu, Quin, was summoned at Tulla District Court, for failing to stamp National Health insurance cards, Mr. M. J. Power, solr., defen- ding, said the defendant had ac- tually been on his way to the Post Office to get the stamps when the Civil Bill officer met him and served the Civil Bill for £3 15s. 0d., the value of the stamps for which he had been already decreed. The pre- sent proceedings then followed and defendant admitted the offence.

Mr. M. J. Walshe, State Solicitor, prosecuting on behalf of the Minis- ter for Social Welfare, said that be- fore the case came to Court defen- dant had been trying to evade his responsibilities. He had a boarded out boy employed and by agree- ment was to maintain and clothe him, also to pay him £16 a year in wages. Instead of paying him that amount he paid him only 2/- a week by way of pocket-money, and did not stamp his insurance cards.

District Justice Hurley, B.L., im- posed a fine of £5.

**SUNDAY OPENING IN THE COUNTRY**

On the motion of Mr. J. Degan, seconded by Mr. E. F. Kerin, Ennis Urban Council adopted a resolution from Kilkee Town Commissioners requesting the Minister for Justice to permit licensed traders in the country to open for the same hours on Sundays as prevailed in cities.

Mr. Degan pointed out that lic- ensed traders in holiday resorts were particularly hampered by the existing law and some amendment was needed. The country man was probably as thirsty on a Sunday as the city man.
