Mr. Sean Keating, Delegate to
Comhairle Ceanntair, stated that

DEATH OF MR. J. DEVANNY, NEWCASTLE WEST

His numerous friends in the

KILFINANE PARISH COUNCIL

AND FIRE-FIGHTING STATION

At the monthly meeting of
Kilfinane Parish Council (write
our Kilfinane correspondent) the
decision to remove the sub-Fire
Fighting Station from Kilfinane to
Kilmallock was discussed.

It was pointed out that Kilfinane
because of its geographical position
was the most suitable location from
which to operate a Fire Station for
East Limerick. This fact had been
realised two years ago and the
Parish Council, in co-operation with
the Co. Manager, suggested suitable
housing accommodation. These
houses for the Fire Unit were in-
spected by Co. Council engineer
and two sites were considered very
suitable. All preparations were
apparently complete when Major
Comerford inspected Kilfinane and
Kilmallock and, as was said at the
Co. Council meeting a week ago,
Kilmallock was considered more
suitable, on his recommendation.

It is understood that Galbally
Ballylanders and Kilbehenny, the
districts that will be served by the
Fire Unit, have requested that the
site for same be at Kilfinane, and
request Major Comerford to make
a full statement on his inspection
and decision in this matter.
