PASSES AWAY AT FERMOY

The death occurred recently at the Convent of the Little Company of Mary, Monument Hill, Fermoy, County Cork, of Sister Mary James Dore, member of a very old and esteemed Newcastle West family. Deceased, who was 39 years in the religious life, of which she spent 37 years in Fermoy, was one of a family which has given several members to the religious life. She was a native of Camas, Newcastle West. She was sister of Mrs. Nora Hough, Maiden Street, Newcastle West, and of Rev. James Dore, Newhaven, U.S.A. Two of her nephews are also in religion—Rev. Father Cyril Dore, D.D., also of Newhaven, and Rev. Father Bernardine Dore, O.F.M., Durban, South Africa. His Lordship, Most Rev. His TX consists of a 6G6 V.F.O., Huffer/Doubler, 6L6 Buffer/Doubler or Buffer Amplifier, 6L6 Buffer Amplifier, T20 P.A. maximum input H5 watts. The modulator is a pair of KT66's in AB1 Mike in use is a single button carbon.

The Antenna is a half-wave dipole running N.W.-S.E., about 38 ft. high.

The RX is a SX 15 with an 1852 pre-selector on 14 Mc and 28 Mc.

As you can see, it is quite a nice layout, and it shows what can be done with small valves as most of the tubes are of the low output class. One has only to glance at Allan's Q.S.L. cards to realise how much of the world he has worked.
