A HEAVY FINE

ILLEGAL USE OF PETROL

Before Mr. C. S. Kenny, B.L.,
D.J., at Dromcollogher Court, on
Friday, 4th inst., Denis Noonan,
lorry owner, Gortroe, Castletown-
conyers pleaded guilty to making
false and misleading returns to the
Department of Industry and Com-
merce in respect of turf deliveries
for the purpose of obtaining per-
mits for the purchase of petrol.

Mr. M. Power, State Solicitor's
Office, prosecuting, said the defen-
dant represented to the Department
that he delivered 282 loads of turf
between August, 1947, and January,
1948, whereas he only delivered
three loads. As a result, he obtained
1,500 gallons of petrol.

Mr. P. J. Liston, solicitor, defend-
ing, said Noonan was a farmer's
son, and was owner of a sandpit,
from which he made deliveries with
the lorry. He was also engaged in
the turf business, but the industry
had declined since the resumption
of coal imports. He was normally
entitled to a petrol allowance of 60
gallons per month in respect of the
lorry, but that allowance had been
entirely cut off since February last.
The petrol was used in delivering
sand and gravel, which was of as
much national importance as turf.

Mr. Power said there was no sug-
gestion of black marketing the
petrol.

Imposing a fine of £50, the Justice
said if there was any suggestion of
black marketing the petrol, he
would have sent the defendant to
jail for six months, as he was deter-
mined to stop this kind of offence.
Declining a plea for reduction in
the penalty, the Justice said he
would allow three months to pay,
and meanwhile, a petition could be
submitted to the Minister.
