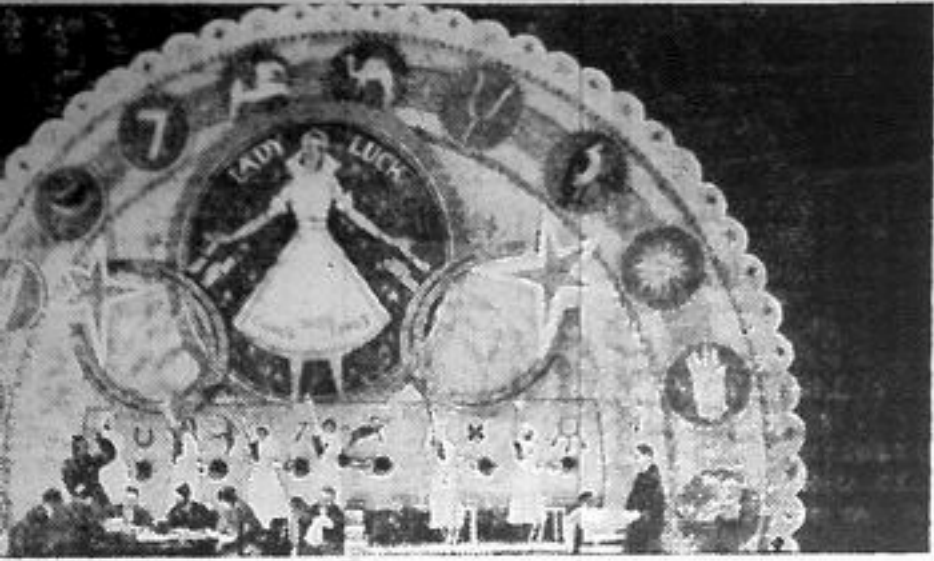

Tomato Troubles

There are at least two dozen common diseases of the tomato, and it is well that growers should be familiar with them and know how to treat them.

Cladosporium fulvum only attacks tomatoes under glass, and we know the familiar greyish mould that comes on the leaves at this time of year, turns purple and then brown, withering up the leaves as the fungus spreads rapidly through the house.

Over-crowded badly ventilated houses are especially liable to be attacked. Houses that have been attacked should always be disinfected during winter by spraying the structure thoroughly with a solution of cresylic acid or by burning sulphur in them after the crop is harvested.

There are some immune varieties. In varieties which are resistant to do not get attacked by Cladosporium fulvum, and some of these have proved to be a commercial success.

Grey mould, Botrytis cinerea, can cause a serious amount of damage to both indoor and outdoor crops in this part of the country. This fungus thrives only when there is abundant moisture present and this condition often occurs in County Limerick, where many growers are growing their crop by spraying the flowers with water each mid-day.

It shows as a fluffy greyish fungus growth, situated on the jagged bases of buds, pruning cuts, or at the junction of the fruit stalk and the fruit. From here it can grow to and kill the main stem and all the plant above this, but even when arrested here by cutting out the diseased portion of the stem and rubbing in a sulphur paste or even flowers of sulphur, I note that it is very difficult to control the spores attacking the fruit stems.

Tomato and potato blight are one and the same fungus disease "Phytophthora infestans". It can attack potatoes and tomatoes in the open, but I have also seen it attack tomatoes in a cold glasshouse during very bad weather.

This fungus damages the foliage, and the tubers of the potato, but it causes most damage to the fruits in the case of the tomato. The blight does not generally attack until after the end of June. It takes the form of the tomato fruits of brown blotches. These soon turn into blackish brown hard patches, which never ripen but often rot the fruits.

There are very reliable proprietary washes on the market for the purpose, and it is a good plan to spray the tomatoes each time the potatoes are being done. It is well, however, to plant tomatoes as far as possible away from the potatoes.

Other fairly common diseases of the tomato are Root Rots, Foot Rots, Wilt, Mosaic, Stripes, and other virus diseases. These virus diseases are dangerous, not only
