19,000 ON STRIKE

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GRAVE POSITION AT LONDON DOCKS

The strike at the London Docks entered on its second week this morning and the number of un- employed was increased to nearly 19,000, due to stevedores and cold storage workers in the West India Docks coming out in sympathy with their colleagues.

There are now 137 ships lying idle in the port and of this num- ber 50 have their entire cargo in- tact. Some of the men were asked this morning to return to work so that negotiations could be started to effect a settlement, but they re- fused.

Should troops be called upon to unload the vessels, it is feared that the employees at the great Smith- field Meat Market, London, may also strike.

It is expected that the British Cabinet will intervene to-day, while the men's Union are holding a mass meeting in the Royal Albert Hall to-morrow.

A TOWN WIPED OUT

Fire yesterday completely des- troyed the main part of Castries, capital of St. Lucia, in the Wind- ward islands (West Indies), for the second time in 21 years.

Its 20,000 inhabitants face serious food and supply shortages, with not a single grocery or drug store still standing. A thousand people lost their homes and the town centre was completely gutted, but

The public desire to see more work like this done locally by the Society, and it is the unanimous opinion of our commit- tee that the public would give generously to any fund for the fur- therance of this good work, in any respect here in Limerick, and many kind donors are very anxious to see some improvement in the home conditions of the children of tuber- culous mothers as hitherto sugges- ted by this committee.
