STRONG NOTE

PROTEST AGAINST SOVIET BLOCKADE

The U.S.A., Great Britain and
France have prepared a serious
note to the Soviet Union, protesting
against the blockade of greater
shipments to the Western sectors
of Berlin, according to reports quo-
ted in Washington to-day.

It was understood that this com-
munication had not yet been sent
to the Soviet Foreign Ministry and
that the contents would not be
made public until it had reached
its destination in possibly the
course of the next few days.

A HEFTY BET

YOUNG GIRL'S CLAIM

A girl who had a bet of £500 each
way on "Regret," the 66 to 1 win-
ner of the Manchester November
Handicap last season, had a claim
for £41,250 against a well-known
British firm of bookmakers deci-
ded by Tattersall's Committee to-
day.

The claimant was Miss Rachael
Evans, of Brington, Northampton-
shire. She stated after the Com-
mittee meeting that the book-
maker concerned had agreed to
pay her £14,000 before August 1st,
£10,000 during the following
month, and the balance within 12
months. Her case was that she
posted a bet of £500 each way on
"Regret," which won at 66 to 1.
The bet was sent to a well-known
bookmaker, who, it was stated, dis-
puted the claim on the grounds
that, under his betting rules, com-
missions by letter were limited to
£2.

The decision of Tattersall's Com-
mittee was not made known pub-
licly.
