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## GETS £100 COMPENSATION

Before Judge Barra O'Brien in the Clare Circuit Court on Saturday, George Haggan, Market St., aged 12, was awarded £100 compensation for an injury to his thumb which the Judge held had been caused by the negligence of the servants of the Clare Co. Council while using a fire engine.

Evidence was given that the applicant was fishing with a line, hook and worm and had been sitting on the wall of the river while the fire engine was out on a practice fire drill. The door of the engine cab swung back and caught the applicant's thumb against the wall as a result of which he lost a joint of his left thumb. When the accident occurred the fishing line fell into the river.
