Taoiseach's Speech

OPPOSITION - CRITICISED

The Taoiseach (Mr. Costello), replying in the Dail to-day to the debate on the vote for his Department, criticised the Opposition for the attitude they had taken up.

The Taciseach said that he had rarely listened during his period s a Deputy to a debate that had been conducted on such a low level as that on the vote for his Depart-The Opposition showed an utter disregard for the general interest and welfare of the people. Almost every conceivable topic had been introduced into the debate-from cabbages and cheese to Republics and inflation. He would the injured mas removed to his need to be a political Poo Bah to be able to deal fully and answer all the points raised.

Proceeding, the Taolseach said that the low standard of the debate had been set by Deputy Lemass, who had referred to the Government as "This set-up" and wanted to know how long it was going to last. The speech of the Deputy was unworthy of any man with a sense of responsibility. The speech was devoid of anything in the nature of

constructive criticism.

He would tell Deputy Lemass that not one member of the Government wanted to remain in office for power, place or patronage.

Earlier in the debate, Mr. O'Flanagan said that if Deputy McEntee was under the impression that there would be an early general election he might as well be whistling jigs to a tombstone.
