WOULD NOT DECIDE

DIRECT CONFLICT OF EVIDENCE

District Justice D. F. Gleeson was confronted with a direct conflict of evidence at Sixmilebridge District Court on Thursday, when Thomas Gerald, of Sixmilebridge, was summoned by Guard Murphy for driving a motor car without a tail light.

The Guard swore that he recognized the defendant's car with the aid of a flash lamp and defendant swore that he was not on the road arrested by the Guard on that particular night.

The defendant's evidence was corroborated by Christopher Sheehan.

District Justice took a note of the evidence and asked Superintendent Lavan to inquire further into the case as the evidence up to the present disclosed a serious position. It was quite obvious, he said, that either the Guard was perjuring himself or the two witnesses. He did not come to any conclusion at the moment and on the evidence against him he dismissed the case.

SALE OF A COW

DECISION IN WARRANTY CASE

District Justice C. S. Kenny, B.L., sitting at Newcastle West Civil Bill Court, gave his decision in the adjourned case in which John Kiely, Dromore, Ballagh, brought a civil bill against John O'Brien, Farrihy, Broadford, for £15 for alleged breach of warranty in the sale of a cow.

Evidence in the case was given at the previous Court when plaintiff gave evidence in support of his claim for £11 as the price of the cow, and £4 for consequential loss.

Giving judgment, the Justice awarded a decree for £4 with 10/- expenses.
