WEEKLY CATTLE AND SHEEP MARKET.

Wednesday, July 28th—Supplies on the lighter side, especially in the young store cattle section; good entry of prime fat cattle and forward stores. Usual attendance of buyers. Prime heifers and bullocks easily placed at full current rates, preference being for nice medium weighted heifers, for which top rates were freely paid. Well meated heifer cows met a firm selling trade; secondary and heavier sorts also drew attention on the basis of late rates; forward stores with age and condition enquired for, well bred bullocks with quality easily negotiated round recent terms; useful feeders sold at current values. Small entry of young stores, not many choice lots on offer, trade quieter in this department; rates for useful bullocks and heifers about maintained, the turnover almost equal to last week. A particularly good clearance effected. Fat heifers and bullocks, best, £42 10s. to £49 10s.; second run, £35 to £39 10s. Fat cows, best, £46 to £50; second run, £32 to £38 15s.; others, £26 to £30 10s. Old, £20 10s. to £24 15s. Shipping bullocks, £35 to £43 10s. 1½ year old bullocks and heifers, £16 to £21 15s.

Sheep—An extra heavy supply for a July market, and an excellent turn out of mutton. Usual attendance. Trade opened quiet, with value position easier; prime wethers and hoggets commanded most attention, especially nice medium weights; heavy sheep and rougher lots again met a dull market. Trade for ewes quiet, choice fat lambs met steady enquiry and sold well; all round business did not indicate the activity of last week. Buyers operating cautiously, market easier and rates ruled on a lower basis; fair clearance. Fat middle weight, 167/6 to 172/-; second run, 154/- to 160/-; small, 122/6 to 130/-. Hoggets, best, 170/- to 180/-; second run, 150/- to 160/-; small, 120/- to 145/-. **Ewes**, 140/- to 150/-. **Lambs**, best, 110/- to 118/-; second run, 100/- to 106/-; small, 66/- to 85/-.—Wm. B.
