The Co. Secretary (Mr. T. F. Broe) said that a number of road workers were at the moment being paid weekly. The implementation of the Minister's suggestion would entail the employment of extra clerical assistants in the Council's offices.

Mr. Quaid asked if there had been any applications from the workers themselves for weekly payment.

The Manager (Mr. P. J. Meghen, B.E.) said he had received no direct application from the men themselves, for such a system of payment, but he had been approached by Mr. M. J. Keyes, T.D., and Mr. Sean Hayes with a view to adopting such a system. If the Council required that road workers should be paid on a weekly basis, he or his officials would have no objection.

After some brief discussion, it was decided to adopt the recommendation of the Minister.

Throughout the text the author makes many wise suggestions for improving the system of local and national government in Eire, and for developing co-operation in our Irish rural economy.
