Limerick Junior Hurlers' Win

ALL-IRELAND SEMI-FINAL

Limerick reached the home final of the All-Ireland Junior Hurling Championship when by 4-5 to 2-5 they showed clear superiority in resisting the challenge of Galway at the Gaelic Grounds on Sunday. Played in weather which was not favourable and with a strong breeze blowing, the match never gave the 3,000 or so gathering much to shout about. Galway did badly when with the strong wind they were held to level scoring at the interval, with only four points on the board. On the resumption Limerick were expected to show improvement and this they did, to run out very comfortable winners. As an All-Ireland semi-final the match was totally disappointing. Rarely did the standard of hurling attain brilliant heights. The first period, in particular, was sadly lacking in finesse, but there were thrills in the second-half which compensated for the shortcomings before the interval. During the second half the home side shaped confidently, and they had an outstanding player in Murphy, who rallied his mates with capital scoring shots. The home defence was very sound, and in the outfield Stokes and Daly caught the eye for solid work. Boland and Crowley, with Murphy, were the men in the forward division who shone. It was evident that the Limerick attack was more sprightly than that of the opposition. Galway were first to get moving and they opened the scoring with a point, per Carlos. There was a quick equaliser when O'Grady turned the ball over the bar. For ten minutes Limerick were content to keep their lines intact and O'Donoghue, Hall and Guiney distinguished themselves, Galway had some good opportunities, subsequently, but they were frittered away badly. It was about the 25th minute when Daly put Limerick in the lead by a point but there was a quick reply from Galway when Mooney sent over. 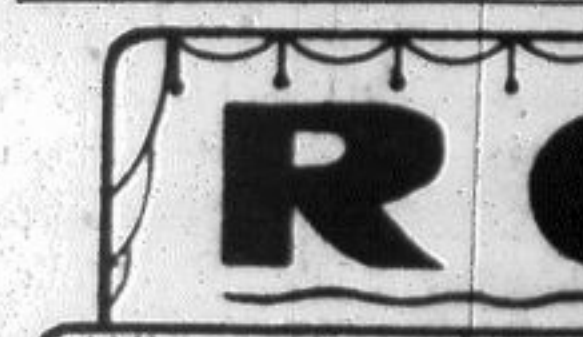
