THE IRISH ELK

INTERESTING FIND NEAR BUTTEVANT

An interesting find of the per-
fectly preserved skeleton of an an-
cient Irish elk was made at
Moanroe, Churchtown, near Butte-
vant, Co. Cork, by workers on the
Abbey River drainage scheme.

The skeleton gives a striking idea
of the size of the prehistoric
beast. Experts who have examined
it are of opinion that it is at least
3,000 years old.

The antlers measure eleven feet
from point to point, and the com-
bined weight of skull and antlers
is 2 cwt. The jaw contains 36
teeth, and the bones resemble
highly polished old ivory.

The foreman, Mr. Patrick
O'Brien, immediately reported his
find and had the skeleton carefully
raised and removed to the County
Council offices at the Mallow
Courthouse. There they were ex-
amined by Professor Doyle, of the
National Museum, and subsequently
removed to Dublin, where they will
be placed in the Museum.

The district where the bones were
discovered is marshy and low lying.
Further excavations are taking
place.

During 1946/'47 the State re-
ceived £1,817,678 from death duties,
an increase of £600,000 on 1942.
Gross receipts from income tax
topped £13,000,000. Receipts from
Corporation profits tax amounted
to £4,758,000.

DEATH OF PRIEST

VERY REV. MICHAEL F. KIVLEHAN, P.P.

We regret to announce the death
of Very Rev. M. F. Kivlehan, P.P.,
Dunlavin, Co. Wicklow, which took
place at the Parochial House, yes-
terday. A member of an old and
highly respected Limerick family,
the late Father Kivlehan had
numerous friends in his native city
and news of his premature demise
will occasion widespread regret
and sorrow.

Educated at Rockwell College, he
was ordained at Maynooth in 1913,
and served at Waterloo (Liver-
pool), Oldtown (Co. Dublin), City
Quay, Arran Quay, Francis St. and
St. Margarets. He was appointed
Parish Priest of Dunlavin last
January.

He was brother of the late Rev.
Mother Mary Carmel, F.C.J., Bun-
clody, and Mother Pulcheria,
Loreto Convent, Letterkenny. Other
surviving relatives are Miss Rose
Kivlehan (Galway), Mr. Alphon-
sus Kivlehan (Limerick), Mr.
John J. O'Hare, solicitor (Dublin)
and Dr. O'Hare, Plymouth (nep-
hews).
