### DEATH OF MR. F. ROCHE, RATHKEALE

The death of Mr. Frank Roche, which occurred after a brief illness at Ballybunion, on August 29th, caused a profound shock when the sad news came to his home in Rathkeale (writes our Rathkeale correspondent). A member of a highly esteemed family, he was a well-known cattle dealer and also carried on a lucrative business as victualler in Main Street. Upright and straightforward, he was a very fine type of man and was admired and respected by all sections of the general public in his native town and by many friends elsewhere.

The remains were brought to St. Mary's Church, Rathkeale, on Sunday evening and solemn requiem Mass for the repose of his soul was offered up there on Tuesday morning. The celebrant of the Mass was Rev. G. Enright, C.C.; deacon, Rev. T. Culhane, C.C.; sub-deacon, Rev. T. Costello, C.C.; master of ceremonies, Rev. S. Willmot, C.C. In the choir were Rev. W. J. a line out of its context. No doubt he would like me to elaborate a little. So here in toto is that part of the interview:—"We then," wrote the reporter, "got on the question of the link with sterling. Some of Mr. MacBride's supporters had been using the phrase, 'Cutting the link with sterling' round the country during the election campaign, as though it were a bond of political servitude. Mr. MacBride agreed that it was dangerous to treat an economic question of this kind in such a free and easy way."

The reporter then commented:—"He did not seem very anxious to discuss financial details; possibly it is not his strong point."

### "WITH DIVERS TONGUES."

Now, this interview clearly shows that before the election Mr. MacBride and his supporters had not hammered out any financial policy on which they were agreed. Instead, they spoke with divers tongues on many issues, a fact which led to their heavy losses at the polls. It also explains why many of their wild promises have been dropped. For instance, in their election literature they held that Ministers' salaries had been increased by £10 per week. But both Mr. MacBride and Trinity College-educated Dr. Noel Brown never mention the matter nowadays. The boot, you know, is on the other foot.

Again, education provided another target for their dummy bullets. The air was filled with leaflets proclaiming the iniquities of the "murder machine." Yet, what has happened with reference to the grants for heating and cleaning schools? Is it not also a fact that in the interests of economy, certain new schools planned for the working man's child will not now be built? Did any of the Clann na Poblachta Deputies take the trouble of explaining the details of the rating system for teachers? Do they now hold that an increase of £2 per year, or, in round figures, 9d. a week, will raise the salaries of thousands of teachers to a level commensurate with their professional status? But, perhaps, Clann na Poblachta have not yet learned that the first essential for any party which wishes to be taken seriously is to have a common policy agreed on by all its supporters and henchmen.

And now Mr. Russell asks me if I am satisfied that our monetary policy has fulfilled its primary function. He must forgive me if I answer him by asking if Clann na Poblachta have even yet agreed among themselves upon a detailed monetary policy, and, if so, would he publish it, with special reference to the sterling link and the rate of exchange. I fully agree with him, however, in stressing the necessity for increased production. And I would suggest that the way to ensure the desired increase is to implement the Fianna Fail policy, which was making such rapid strides in 1938. In other words, a drive for maximum industrial and agricultural employment, and not by a return to the disastrous pre-1932 economy.

### SECRET SOCIETIES.

Finally, I would ask Mr. Russell to clarify the official attitude of Clann na Poblachta towards secret societies. This is a matter of importance to all citizens of a non-leftist outlook. On this very subject the following pronouncement from Mr. de Valera, taken from the official report of Dail Eireann, October, 1931, is worth quoting. He said:—"I will say this now about secret societies, that since the Volunteers were founded, they were never necessary, that if it was required to get examples to prove that the Catholic doctrine with respect to them is right, I could give examples, because every evil that was said to flow from these societies has to my knowledge flown from them."

How right he was has since been proved by the emergence of the Communist Party of Ireland in 1933. The manifesto which that Party published contains an introduction written by a member of a secret society. That man is to-day the chairman of the Irish Communist Party.
