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barometer on the 30th, 30.37; lowest
on the 2nd, 29.53; for the same days
at U.C.C., 30.47 and 29.49, respec-
tively, which shows very close re-
cordings and correct instrument
readings.

Temperature—The thermometer
showed the warmest days to be the
4th, 15th and 27th with 71 F., 70 F.
and 72 F. degrees of heat, and in
London 71 F. was recorded on the
25th, as against Limerick's 67 de-
grees. The coldest night was the
21st at 41 F.

Rainfall—Total, 3.20 inches, as
against 3.84 in 1947. Number of
rainy days or nights was 23, two
more than last year. At the other
side of the city 3.29 inches were re-
corded at Messrs. Shaw's, Mulgrave
Street, which shows that the rain
was evenly distributed over the
city.

Remarks—Weather conditions
were an all-round improvement as
compared with last September,
although some days were dull and
oppressive. Winds were light and
mainly westerly.—W. J. Horne.
