chronicle the demise of Mr. Michael
Stritch, licensed vintner, Clonlara,

At the removal of the remains

After Requiem High Mass to-day,
the funeral took place to the an-
cient cemetery of Thoumpal (Gil-
logue), the family burial place. The
cortege was one of the largest seen
in the district for many years.
